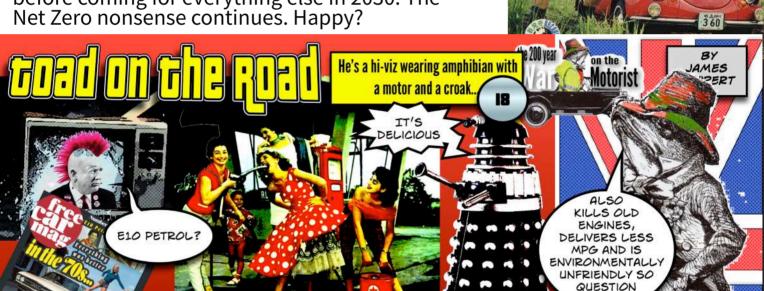

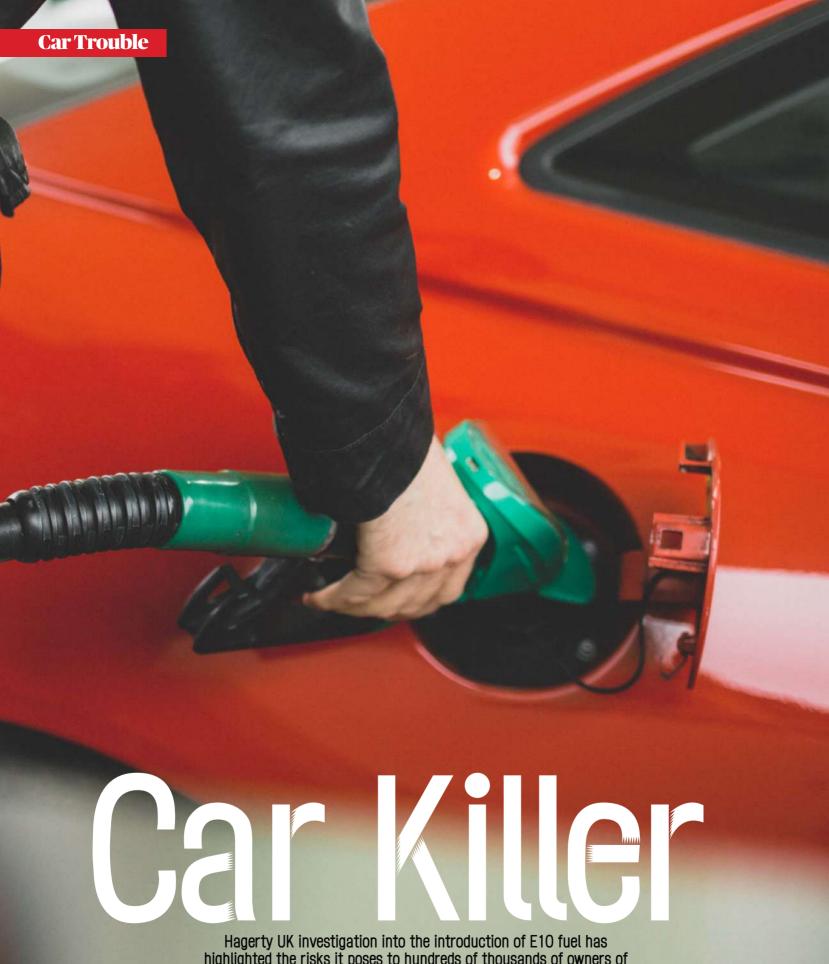

xperts warn that the introduction of E10 is the most significant threat to old cars since the switch from leaded to unleaded fuel. Four-star fuel was banned in Britain from 2000, on environmental grounds. It's for similar concerns over air pollution and CO2 emissions that E10 will soon be dispensed by the nation's petrol pumps.

### What is E10?

Petrol sold in the UK contains up to five percent bioethanol – labelling on unleaded pumps changed to E5 in 2019 to reflect that. From 2021 E10 will become the new standard with up to ten per cent bioethanol in the blend. Produced from crops such as sugar beet bioethanol isn't a fossil fuel and is renewable.

Why is it being introduced?

Emissions targets. The Government has targeted 2050 as the year that Britain will reduce its greenhouse gas emissions to a net zero. By introducing E10 fuel it is claimed CO2 emissions could be reduced by 750,000 tonnes per year. That's the equivalent of taking 350,000 cars off the road.

Although many cars run E5 without significant problems, doubling the amount of ethanol in the fuel can cause a variety of issues in older cars. Ethanol is hygroscopic, which means that it absorbs water from the atmosphere. And that water, in turn, finds its way into your car. This can lead to condensation in fuel tanks, fuel lines and carburettors and cause corrosion in brass, copper, lead, tin and zinc components.

As ethanol is also a solvent it can eat through rubber, plastic and fibreglass, so hoses and seals are likely to perish more quickly because of the higher concentration of ethanol in E10.

Department for Transport tests have identified problems including degradation to fuel hoses and seals, blocked fuel filters, damaged fuel pumps, corroded carbs, blocked injectors and corrosion in fuel tanks. Rubber is particularly affected.

In addition, ethanol isn't as energy dense as petrol which means that the fuel-air mix could be leaner and may increase fuel consumption (in comparison to E5).

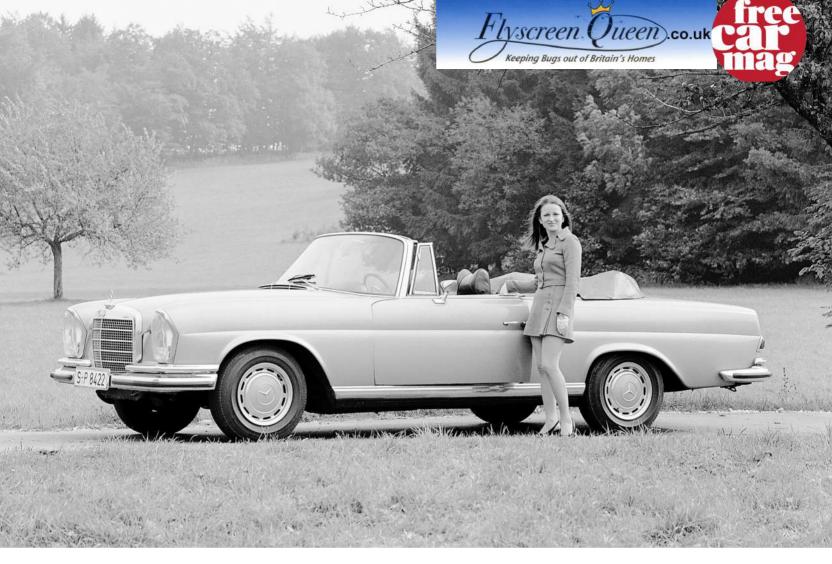
The RAC estimates that up to 600,000 cars on the road are not compatible with the new fuel, and it's not just classics that are affected. Anyone owning a car made before 2002 is advised not to use E10 – and it can affect cars made up until 2011.

### What does the fuel industry say

?

Phil Monger, Technical Director of the Petrol Retailers Association stresses that change won't be made overnight and believes that many owners of old cars may have already made modifications since the introduction of E5 fuel. "Vehicles that are very old will have materials that will not be compatible with E5 either. E10 will only hasten the day when it causes you some difficulty with those materials."





Hagerty asked Guy Lachlan, MD of Classic Oils, to offer some preventative advice "You've either got to use fuel with no ethanol or change the materials that don't like it. If you are in any doubt about your rubber fuel lines, change them. Get rid of your fibreglass petrol tank and install an aluminium one. The other thing ethanol really doesn't like is solder. If you are running a soldered float in your carburettor, then think about carrying a spare – they're generally quite easy to change."

When it comes to storing your car, if it is older than 1996 and doesn't have a catalytic converter, you can use a lead replacement additive such as Castrol's Classic Valvemaster which can help prevent corrosion as it also contains an ethanol stabiliser. This product has received endorsement by the Federation of British Historic Vehicle Clubs.

For modern classics there are catalyst-friendly additives available such as Millers Ethanol Protection Additive or Lucas Oil Ethanol Fuel Conditioner, but your best advice is to check with the car manufacturer or relevant owners club.

If you fill up with E10 in error the RAC advises that, unlike putting diesel into a petrol car (or vice versa) you shouldn't need to drain the tank. It could cause pinking and make it harder to start from cold, but one fill-up shouldn't cause lasting damage. The advice is to top up with E5 as soon you can – ideally when you've used at least a third of the tank – and don't leave the car in storage until you've done so.

The only good news is that super unleaded is set to remain at the E5 standard for five more years after the introduction of E10, according to the PRA. And most E5 currently only actually contains 2-3 per cent ethanol anyway. The bad news is that it

costs more – typically 15 pence per litre meaning each time you fill up it could cost you an extra £6-10.

At the top of the page is a mini van which would only be a few years old at the time (1978), but is as rusty as an old pushbike fished out of the canal. That was the reality of the '70s, cars fell apart pretty quickly and looked well used. Films and TV shows that seek to recreate the era often overlook that. Certainly the motors in Prime Suspect on ITV looked a bit too clean. The rather weird arthouse High Rise has some car park action with a mix of '60s, '70s and '80s models which is fun to look at. Probably the most bizarre thing they do is blot out the lights on the Triumph Stag to make it look different from the hero car on one of the posters. As if people like us wouldn't notice, well the '82 on an X plate is an attention grabber for geeks. Then there is 'The Good Guys', which is a decent enough film, Russell Crowe is always great. Not being a resident of LA in the '70s I can't confirm its accuracy, looks pretty cool of course. There is a spectacularly grungy

Mercedes SE Convertible. Hard to believe it would have deteriorated so much in salt free California. However, after being riddled with bullets it does seem to have been restored by the end, unless the film has been shot backwards. Anyway, the important thing is to always be on the look out for cars especially in the original period films and TV. They will be cars that no set designer, props or art wonk would ever consider. Anyway, take a look at these retro features for fun and guidance.





f you watched telly in the 1970s and liked cars, you loved Hazell. Here was a bloke with some taste. It was more than the simple Lact that he had a beautiful Stag, but that he also managed to keep it roadworthy. That V8 engine made a magnificent sound, but as we all know it could overheat and expire in clouds of steam. Not for James Hazell, that's how super cool he actually was. The great news is that you can watch all the episodes on Talking Pictures TV.

Hazell was a private eye created by a footballer. Incredible at the time and still fairly remarkable now to find someone who kicked a ball for a living to have the creativity and intelligence to come up with something so original. Terry Venables, a Chelsea and QPR regular was not alone though and had professional help from novelist and sports writer Gordon Williams. They were both responsible for the 1974 novel Hazell Plays Solomon using the pseudonym of 'P.B. Yuill'. Luckily this caught the eye of TV producer June Roberts. By that time Venables was managing Crystal Palace.

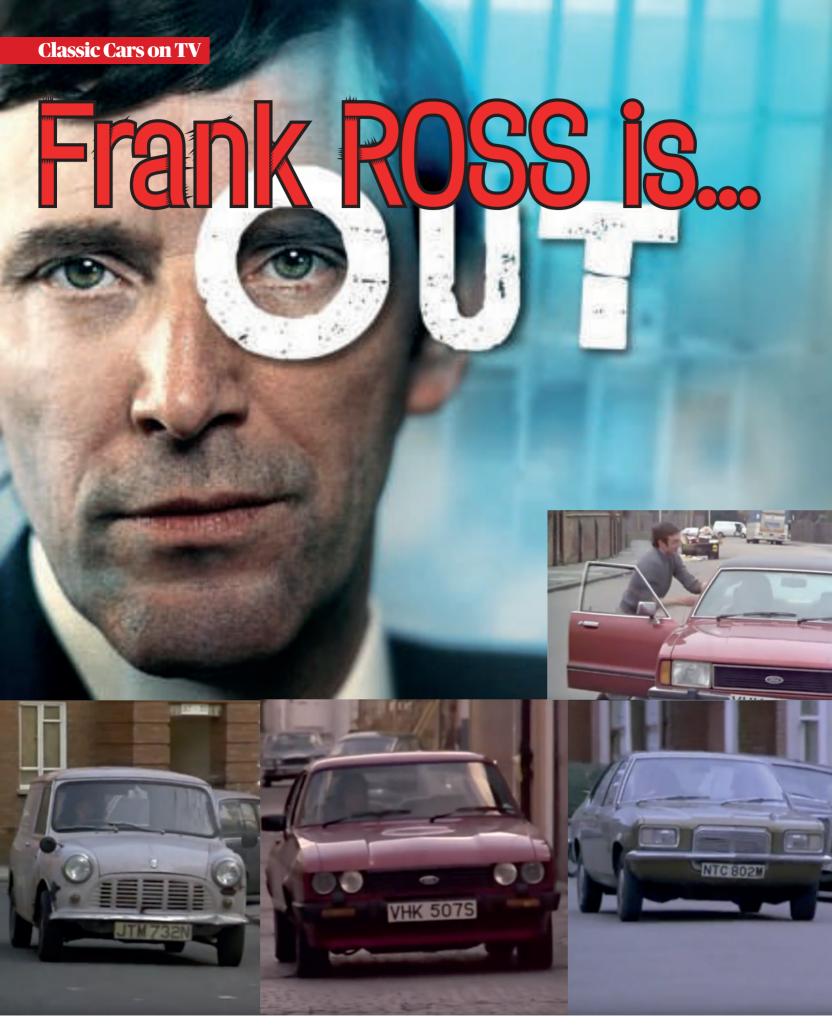
A proper London cockney detective with a flash car and a nice line in patter with a distinctly Phillip Marlowe style voiceover. It took a while for the first series to really get going and settle down into a proper larky, brutish but stylish style, but once it did with some

changes in the script editing department and the series was off. Hazell was initially stifled in 1978 by something peculiar to the era, a strike by technicians, just ten of the projected 13 episodes

were made. A fascinating fact is that John Nettles, who later became Bergerac, was up for the role. It is hard to think that he could have been better than Ball, but it must be remembered that he also ran a stylish old 1947 Triumph Roadster as his TV detective car. Apparently

that broke down all the time and was a pig to drive.

Ball though was perfect as the ex-cop drummed out after a messy divorce and descent into drink. Cheeky, charming and not afraid to get stuck in and quite often duffed up. The supporting cast is exceptional and you will bump into his Mrs. at the time Pamela Stephenson, otherwise it is everyone else you recognise from The Sweeney and Minder. Indeed, Leon Griffiths, who wrote some scripts would go on to develop Minder (1979-94), the series that replaced Hazell in the ITV schedules. Never mind all that, though just look at the street scenes, Escorts, Allegros and Transit vans. A fantastic slice of 1970s motoring life. That's why we love it and why you must tune into Talking Pictures TV on Virgin 445, Freesat 306, Freeview or Youview 81 or on the Sky digital satellite platform, channel 328.

High altitude living has never looked better, or more disturbing in the brilliant film, High-Rise.

t's 1975. Two miles west of London, Dr. Robert Laing, Tom Hiddleston, moves into his new apartment seeking soulless anonymity, only to find that the building's residents have no intention of leaving him alone.

Being Free Car Mag, we rather adore the 1970s setting and vehicles. Indeed, the film poster we have been featuring in the Mag has a lovely Triumph Stag in it. The roof top car park though presents our inner motoring geek with a few issues. Namely that the registration number on the Stag is an X which puts it in the '80s and instead of double headlamps there are singles. Oh, and there seems to be a Ford Escort XR3i in shot. None of that matters of course because this is a spectacularly arresting film.

Directed by Ben Wheatley and written by Amy Jump (Kill List, Sightseers, A Field In England), High-Rise is an adaptation of J.G.

Ballards's 1975 novel. The film centres around Robert Laing, a young doctor played by Tom Hiddleston who is seduced by a residential tower block and its visionary creator (Jeremy Irons), who has designed the building as a luxurious world apart from the problems of the city it stands in. But when discord sets in among the residents and they split into tribal factions, Laing finds himself in the middle of the mounting violence.

There are plenty of top actors to enjoy, just take a look at this brilliant line up and the twisted grotesques that they are playing. Charlotte (Sienna Miller)... Seductive, professional, single mother, who lives upstairs. Wilder (Luke Evans)... A failing documentary filmmaker and sexual predator. Helen (Elisabeth Moss)...Wilder's heavily pregnant, long-suffering wife. Pangbourne (James Purefoy)... A scheming gynecologist with cold hands. Ann (Keeley Hawes)... The architect's indifferent, aristocratic, trophy wife. Cosgrove (Peter Ferdinando)... A television newsreader and enthusiastic troublemaker. Jane (Sienna Guillory)... A glamorous television actress. Steele (Reece Shearsmith)... Laing's sadomasochistic nosy neighbour.

Not only that, there is music by Portishead. It worth going to see the film to hear their brilliantly doomy take on ABBA's SOS.

# Alliance of British Drivers Driving Sense

# Let Road Users Decide Road Transport Policy



he Alliance of British Drivers totally backs the recommendation in the recent FairFuelUK All Party Parliamentary Group for UK Motorists and Road Hauliers report [Ref.1], to let drivers decide for themselves how to use Britain's roads. Whilst government is obliged to consult haulage, bus, rail, and airline companies over major changes, no government has ever condescended to consult car, van and PTW (Powered Two Wheeler) users, despite taking £1 billion a week from road users in direct and indirect taxation [Ref.2]. It's a case of do as I say, not as I do.

Improvements in road infrastructure to improve the economy, and reduce pollution levels, journey times and accident rates should undergo a full consultation process with ALL stakeholders.

Instead, government takes heed only of well-funded so called "green" lobby groups, whose real aim is to drive people out of their vehicles.

FairFuelUK, the Alliance of British Drivers, the Motorcycle Action Group, the Road Haulage Association and Logistics UK all represent everyday drivers bearing the brunt of top-down, "we know best" attitudes from the political classes.

We urge government to set up a road users' consultative group, weighted in favour of motorised road users.

The Americans gained independence from the British in the War Of Independence during the 1700s with the cry 'No Taxation without Representation'.

espite appearances it isn't a fact and stat based history of the boxy Bertone designed version of the British Leyland Mini. The author, Frank Kirtley, does know his cars, but not to the extent that it would bore someone who wasn't into vehicles. The book itself looks great on your bedside table, not least because the cover features a period (1980s) Dutch registered Innocenti 120 with a moon roof and added wing damage, pictured on a dusty European mountain pass. This suggests, as you read a few chapters in, that the story inside may well be 'based on a fairly true story'. Driving around Spain and France in a boxy mini whilst involved in a cold war spy plot is a massive plus point.
