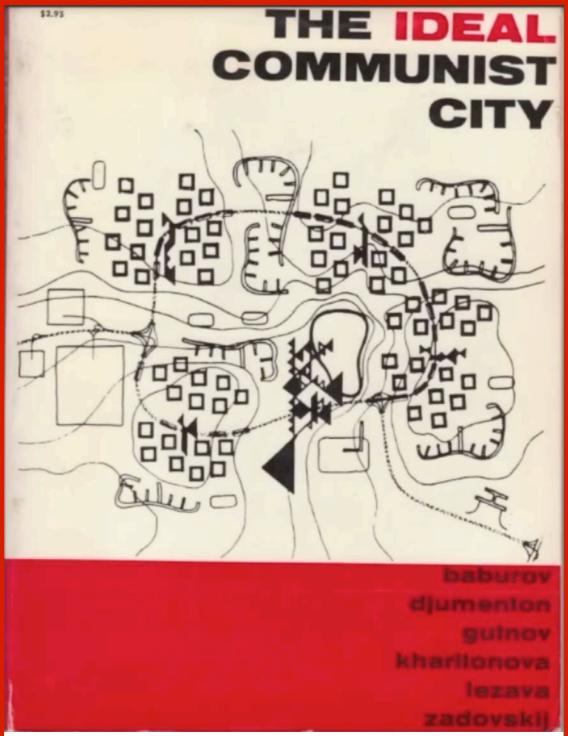

Ever wondered where the 15 minute city concept came from?



The Ideal Communist City (1969) is an English translation of urban concepts advanced by architects and planners from the University of Moscow. The book was first published in a Soviet journal of a communist youth organization in 1960 and was then republished in Italy in 1968. Offering a new way of thinking about mobility, equity and social interaction in neighborhood planning, The Ideal Communist City was a direct response to suburban development and its focus on private spaces for family life: "the new city is a world belonging to all and each" where life is "structured by freely chosen relationships representing the fullest, most well-rounded aspects of each human personality."



- Remove the storage box behind the seat and then later weld it back in four inches higher. This frees up a space for the modifications and the stowaway.
- Remove the seat and the spare tire and saw a 20-inch x 20-inch entrance hole into the piece of sheet metal that serves as the rear panel.
- Dismantle the exhaust pipe cover, and remove the air filters and everything else that takes up unnecessary space.
- The technical modifications and the position of the passenger require the exhaust pipe to be bent.
- Install a floor panel out of sheet metal to the suspension to prevent the stowaway from being burnt by the hot exhaust.
- Sand everything so it's perfectly smooth again, and cut off part of the rear fender so it doesn't scrape the ground with the weight of the stowaway and raise suspicion.
- 7. The last modification is made on the day of the escape: the large 3.5 gallon tank, which Jacobi has already detached from its holder, is unplugged from the gas hose. A small canister, hardly bigger than an oil can, is put in the place of the tank – two quarts of gas is all he will have to get his friend over the border...



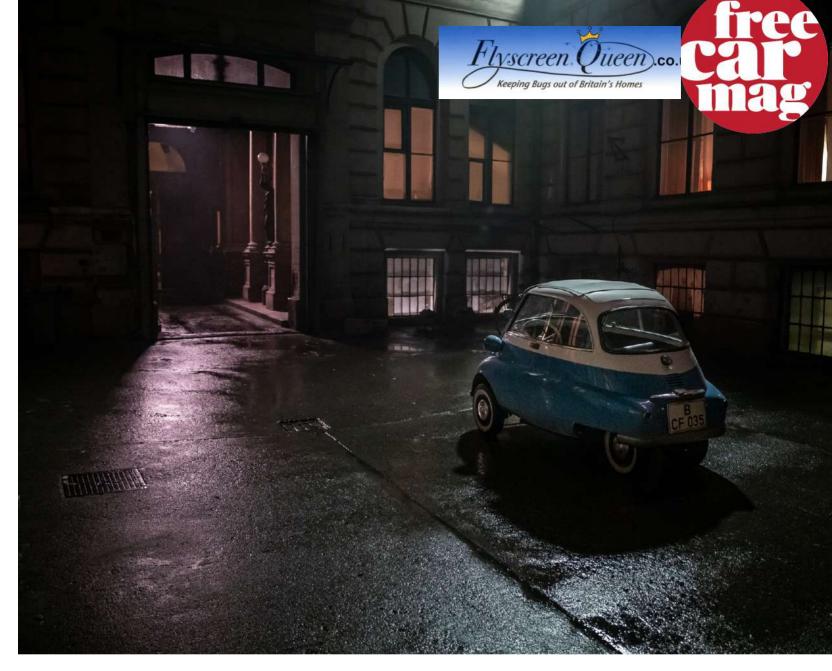


housands of exhibits in the Berlin Wall Museum on Friedrichstrasse, Berlin, commemorate the history of the once divided city, the tightly controlled border between East and West and the people who sought their way to freedom against all odds. On the upper floor near the window, which overlooks Checkpoint Charlie, there is the smallest escape car ever used: a BMW Isetta. Klaus-Günter Jacobi (79) regularly accompanies visitors through the museum as a tourist guide. What only few people are aware of: Jacobi does not only know all about many escape attempts, but that it was his idea to hide a person inside the tiny bubble car and to cross the border with the unnoticed passenger. This is how his best friend managed to escape from East to West Berlin. More than 30 years after the fall of the Berlin wall, BMW recounts the tale of Klaus-Günter Jacobi, his friend Manfred Koster and the mini-car, which helped nine people escape the GDR. This story is the plot of the movie "The Small Escape", which premiered on 2 October 2019 as a TV spot, on Youtube and on other social media channels of the BMW Group.

The elaborately produced blockbuster-style

movie takes the audience back to the year 1964. Jacobi's family had already left the East of the city in 1958, three years before the construction of the Berlin wall. When his old friend Manfred Koster asked him to help him escape from the GDR, he came up with a bold plan. His BMW Isetta was to serve as the escape car. The moto-coupé measuring only 2.30 meters in length and 1.40 meters in width would arouse little suspicion with the border soldiers, or so he hoped. And even today it stills seems virtually impossible to hide a person inside a BMW Isetta. The bubble car is already a very tight fit for two people on the seats directly behind the front door. The hiding place for his friend was built behind the seat bench directly next to the engine. Car mechanic Jacobi carried out the conversion in his former training workshop in Berlin- Reinickendorf. He cut an opening into the trim behind the seat bench, shifted the shelf upwards and removed the spare wheel, heating and air filter. He also exchanged the 13litre fuel tank for a 2-litre canister to make space for the hidden passenger.





he Small Escape"shows how the BMW Isetta was turned into an escape car and how the risky border crossing played out. The thrilling history lesson was produced by director Alex Feil, camera man Khaled Mohtaseb and set designer Erwin Prieb in Hollywood blockbuster style. The props, costumes. vehicles and street sets were created in Budapest to stage a faithful 1960s Berlin setting. A checkpoint complete with wall and border strip was recreated resulting in an oppressive atmosphere which continues to grow throughout the course of the film to then culminate in a happy end. "Since their invention, automobiles have brought freedom and selfdetermination to humankind. Cars bring people together. This is something one should always also keep in mind in the current debate. The movie emphasises this. The moving escape story with the BMW Isetta can also be seen as a symbol of the invaluable value cars and individual mobility can have. It's all about freedom, independence and dreams. Our movie recognises the drive and courage of the people who made this successful escape possible", says Jens

Thiemer, Head of BMW Brand Management. On 23 May 1964, shortly before the border crossing closed on midnight, the BMW Isetta converted by Klaus-Günter Jacobi, rolled underneath the opened barrier. Shortly after crossing, he freed his friend Manfred from his hiding place behind the seat bench and took him in his arms delirious with joy. This was the only time Jacobi's BMW Isetta was used as an escape car, but his achievement was to inspire imitators. Eight further GDR citizens managed to escape to the West over the following years in a similarly converted BMW Isetta. Today this car is on display in the Berlin Wall Museum. The movie "The Small Escape" will also be a permanent exhibit of the permanent exhibition on spectacular escape attempts.

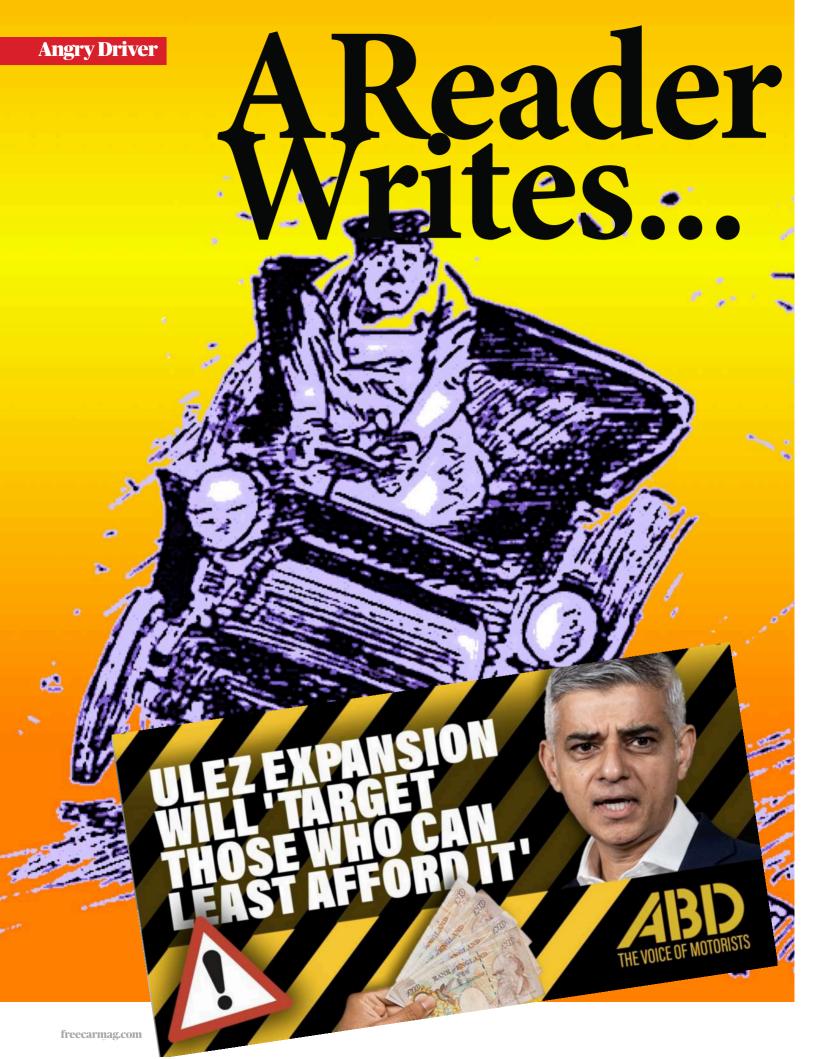

live in Petts Wood, in London Borough of Bromley and fall within his tax on the elderly and less well off families. I have two older neighbours, who like most elderly people, have kept their cars for a long time and kept them well maintained. One is a 97 Nissan Micra and one is a 99 Rover 214 so they will both be clobbered with a £12.50 charge to go to the garden centre or get their hair cut and they cannot afford to get a new car. They cannot walk to these places as they are not well enough to, so Khan is effectively cutting off their lifeline to get out and about. So unfair.

If it was all about emissions, then the cars should be banned from the area, not "you can use your car as long as you pay Khan to use it" — it's just a moneymaking scheme.

On top of this, for example in Camberwell, there have been planters placed on the side roads blocking the roads so all the traffic now has no option but to sit in massive traffic queues on the main roads, so all those people that live on those roads now have congestion (and those "paying polluting" cars) all day every day.

Apparently in the Survey that was carried out over 70% of responders said that the ULEZ should not come out to the outer London boroughs, but Khan has completely ignored the survey and bringing it in anyway. Shocking!

Bromley councillors are quite rightly fighting this ULEZ tax as it will hit Bromley economy as we have lots of people from outside the Borough come to Orpington shopping or work in Bromley – people won't do if it will cost them £12.50. Plus the outside boroughs don't have the congestion and pollution that the inner boroughs do (see above re planters!)

I am lucky – I have a 14 year old Ford Mondeo which luckily is compliant but I feel for the other people where I live.

History Lesson: Railways to Cars

In the late 1820s a new form of transport was evolving, something that was a total revelation to people that had relied on horse transport since the dawn of time. It was faster than a racehorse and could carry much heavier loads. Yes, the railways had arrived!

No longer were people confined to be born-live-die in the same place and this 'cork out of a champagne bottle' moment, was soon grasped and what we now call 'rail mania' was started and rail lines spread at an incredible rate all over Great Britain and the whole world soon followed suit, as people and commerce realised the huge benefits of such a system. On first glance, the concept is very simple: to create neighbourhood's and cities where a person can meet a host of their basic needs via a short walk or bike ride; larger cities also tend to include public transit in the mix. Exactly what defines 'short' varies from place to place". (And, perhaps your general health?) So this is why places like Canterbury, Oxford, and Bath are in the planning stage of dividing cities into car-less 'ghettos'

Some might see this as a return to born-live-die policy of two hundred years ago?

Whatever your views of the above; how will they implement this nonsense when land shortages and land values are so high? It also goes on to say "The greater aim should be to improve accessibility as much as possible to reduce our dependence on cars and reclaim our neighbourhoods for people. This will benefit our health, sustainability and communities." Kev: LBC's Henry Riley (HR) & Sir Keir Starmer (KŠ)

- HR: "We're here in Slough today, many workers here will be commuting into London, on the ULEZ charge - which is scheduled to expand from the 29th August – that's going to hit many workers, do you really think it's the right time to be charging people £12.50 as the Labour Mayor [Sadiq Khan] is recommending, if people's vehicles don't meet certain emission standards"
- KS: "The Mayor has made very clear why he is putting in place & extending the scheme as it is... and he's right about that - of course it's difficult, but he has to take those measures"
- HR: "Śo you support it?" KS: "Yes"

In the last week over 1000 of the 5000 (and counting) FairFuelUK Supporters deliberately excluded from the ULEZ Consultation results by a manipulative London Mayor, have emailed all Labour GLA Members and copied in the Leader, deputy leader and Chair of the UK Labour Party. Howard Cox Founder of FairFuelUK says: "It is more than sickening that the London Mayor chose to ignore the Consultation process where 6 out of 10 respondents opposed the expansion of the ULEZ into Greater London. But it's made even worse that the potential next Prime Minister of our country backs Sadiq Khan's deliberate manipulation of a democratic process. Mark Harper, the Transport Minister and the Prime Minister must step in and overall the decision to expand the ULEZ any further."

Commenting on Sir Keir's remarks Paul Scully, the Minister for London, said "rather than blinding and tribally supporting his Labour Mayor, Keir Starmer needs to speak to people in Outer London who don't quality for the scrapage scheme, don't have the extensive choice of buses and tubes that his own Inner London constituents enjoy and therefore remain dependent on their cars".

Scully, who is also the Conservative MP for Sutton and Cheam, added: "Ulez expansion will have a negligible effect on air quality according to the Mayor's own report, whilst coming at as massive cost for those who can least afford it".
